### **What's it all about?**

You might see yourself as a barrister, solicitor, paralegal, legal executive or a legal secretary. Alternatively, you might want to choose Law because it is a fascinating course which will help you develop transferable skills such as analytical ability, decision making, critical thinking and problem-solving skills. All these skills are highly sought after by higher education and employers. Studying law gives students an understanding of the role of law in today's society and raises their awareness of the rights and responsibilities of individuals.

### **What are the entry requirements?**

9-5 in GCSE English language and English literature.

Law is an academic and rigorous course that requires a high level of analysis, problem-solving together with an excellent memory. The volume of case law and statutes that need to be learnt and applied fluently is extensive; the capacity to do this is important to the course requirement.

### **How will I be assessed?**

The course is linear which means that students will sit all their exams at the end of the two-year course. There are three 2 hour papers with equal weighting. The assessment currently consists of short answer and extended writing questions (evaluative and scenario-based).
