This allows us to identify any students and families that would benefit from early help (we use Worcestershire's Early Help Assessment Tool) and allows us to help them access the services they need both in the school and beyond the school.

Sexual Harassment Training

All staff have completed the Sexual Violence and Harassment between Children and Young People Educare course.

PREVENT Training – Radicalisation.

Mr Gibson has received PREVENT training for DSLs and has trained the safeguarding team on how to identify the early stages of radicalisation and what to do.

All staff have completed the Prevent awareness Educare course.

Child Sexual Exploitation Training

All staff at King Charles I School have been trained to identify early cases of child sexual exploitation. At school we use the CSE screening tool if we have concerns.

Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) Training

All staff have received training on FGM. Teachers know how to identify if a child may be at risk. They know the signs to look for and most importantly how to refer, following the schools safeguarding procedures.

We meet the needs of our young people in a variety of ways:

1. Our consistent use of the Behaviour for Learning protocols enables our students learn in a calm and purposeful atmosphere where each student can achieve to the best of their ability, without disturbances from a minority of students.
2. Students are encouraged to speak about any concerns to a member of staff in our pastoral team. In lessons students are taught to speak openly about their emotions. Students know the staff take all their concerns very seriously.
3. Student questionnaires ascertain whether students feel happy and safe.
4. E-safety assemblies are delivered to all students
5. Anti-bullying assemblies and theatre groups deliver plays to tackle cyber bullying
6. E-safety advice offered to parents/carers
7. Our local PC conducts assemblies and workshops for safety beyond the school and other relevant topics
8. Our School Council play a significant role in student voice
9. High staff presence during unstructured times
10. The DSL attends the Wyre Forest District Schools' panel and The Four Stones Gateway Trust network meetings.
11. PSHE lessons
12. Community Ambassadors programme
13. Pastoral mentoring
14. Peer mentoring
15. Exam stress support groups
16. Relaxation support groups
17. Mentorlink sessions
18. Referrals to our school counsellor.

Attendance

Miss Thomas leads attendance at King Charles I School. We monitor this daily and follow our attendance policy to support students and families with attendance that falls below 95%. The aim is to offer help and solutions to any problems. Parents/Carers can access their child's attendance live via the Edulink Parent App.

- We now hold more than one emergency contact number for each student. This goes beyond the legal minimum and gives us additional options to make contact with a responsible adult when a child missing education is also identified as a welfare and/or safeguarding concern.
- The attendance officer is aware of all students who are LAC, young carers, subject to Child in Need or Child Protection plans and who receive targeted family support.
- We follow appropriate procedures when carrying out reasonable enquiries-eg the designated safeguarding lead (DSL) directs staff to conduct discussions with neighbours, relatives, landlords etc to determine whether a child may be at risk of harm.
- If we are unable to contact parents/carers after 2 days, have no information as to the whereabouts of the student, there is no answer at the home address and neighbours do not know of their whereabouts, the attendance officer requests the police do a safe and well check on the third day of absence, at the latest.
- On the third day of absence, we inform social services, through the Worcestershire Family Front Door, to let them know we have requested a police safe and well check.
- We inform the local authority of any student who has missed 10 school days or more without permission.
- The DSL will record that they have completed these procedures and, if necessary, make a referral to the children's social care or police.

Safeguarding

- All teachers and staff know precisely how to identify and report concerns, via staff training on induction and our regular updates on safeguarding.
- We use the CPOMs database where electronic files are kept securely.
- Child protection paper files are kept securely.
- Our Attendance Team follow children missing from education guidance (see above)
- All new staff complete safeguarding training and this is recorded in the staff training log.

- We have a designated teacher and achievement leader for children in the looked after system and those previously in care.
- We have a record of all staff that have read and understand the latest version of Keeping Children Safe in Education.

Behaviour for Learning at King Charles I School

Students are rewarded with achievement points and can qualify for rewards trips and rewards lunches. Our school behaviour policy is followed consistently and this is monitored rigorously by SLT. Parents/Carers can access their child's behaviour for learning record via the Edulink App.

Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL)

The DSL (Mr Gibson) ensures rigorous and robust systems are in place within the school to ensure the safety of all of our children.

SENCO

Mrs Morgan works with children and families with additional needs and can signpost parents/carers to different agencies depending on the student or parent/carer needs.

Non-teaching Pastoral Support-Achievement leaders

Our achievement leaders are: Mrs Hannon (Year 7), Mrs Williams (Year 8), Miss Brown (Year 9), Miss Underwood (Year 10) and Mrs Palmer (Year 11). Our operational DSL (Mrs Wing) attends all core group meetings, Child in Need and Child Protection and strategy meetings. They all work closely with our Heads of Year to provide pastoral support for students, and all are trained in safeguarding to the same level of the DSL (level 3).

School Counsellor

Miss Bates is our school counsellor.

Link Police Community Support Officer

Our link police officer is Dave Foden. Dave works with targeted students who need additional support both in the community and at school.

Mental Health First Aiders

Our achievement leaders are trained to spot the triggers and signs of mental health issues and the knowledge to help students recover their health by guiding them to further support.

In the latest version of Keeping Children Safe in Education it makes it clear that all staff should be aware of their local early help process and understand their role in it. In addition, this statutory document makes it clear that any child may benefit from early help, but all school staff should be particularly alert to the potential need for early help for a child who:

- Is disabled and has specific additional needs;
- Has special educational needs / disabilities, whether or not they have a education, health care plan;
- Is a young carer;
- Is homeless,
- Is subject to the court system;
- Is showing signs of being drawn in to anti-social or criminal behaviour, including gang involvement and association with organised crime groups;
- Is frequently missing/goes missing from care or from home;
- Is misusing drugs or alcohol themselves;
- Is at risk of modern slavery, trafficking or exploitation;
- Is in a family circumstance which present challenges for the child; such as substance abuse, adult mental health problems or domestic abuse;
- Has returned home to their family from care;
- Is showing early signs of abuse and/or neglect;
- Is at risk of being radicalised or exploited;
- Is a privately fostered child.

Everyone needs help at some time in their lives and therefore an ethos of early help is important for any school. Our offer of Early Help is outlined in the table below. We believe that early interventions for children or families, in many cases, will prevent children from experiencing harm. We will refer to

appropriate agencies when help is required to support children, young people or families or to prevent harm.

All staff must be aware of our offer of early help. At all times all staff should consider if there is any offer of early help that we can make in order to help a child thrive.

We also liaise with other agencies and people within the local community and in the table below are some national organisations that can support children, young people and their families.

School nurse	Our school nurse is Christie Sivell. She is in school on a weekly basis (Mondays). From Year 9, students do not need parents/carers consent to 'drop in' to see the school nurse. However, if you wish to for your child to see the school nurse, please contact Hayley and she will arrange an appointment for the student.
Parenting support	A range of groups and guided sessions are available: Worcestershire support for parents . The Talking Teams programme is also available. Please contact Mrs Bates at the school.
The Front Door to Children's Services	If a member of staff, parent/carer or member of the public thinks a child or young person is at immediate risk of significant harm they should contact the Worcestershire Family Front Door (FFD) – 01905 822 666 or in an emergency always call 999. Do not wait to discuss this with the DSL/DDSL but do report it afterwards.

Children with disabilities team (CwD)	The Children with Disabilities (CwD) Social Work Team provide services designed to meet the needs of children and young people who have complex disabilities. The CwD Social Work Team is one of a range of services that can provide support to children and young people with disabilities and their families. Other services available are those provided by health, education, play and youth services as well as community resources provided by voluntary agencies. The CwD team offer services to those children and young people requiring additional resources in respect of their disability, where the disability has a profound impact on the child or young person's life. An assessment will be offered where the child has a condition which is substantial, long lasting or permanent, is a physical and/or learning disability or a life limiting, life threatening condition. Early Help	Early help guidance for professionals What is early help? Early help means providing support as soon as a problem appears, to stop it from getting worse. This could be at any point in a child's life, from birth to the teenage years. Anyone can provide early help – you don't need to be an expert or a professional. Early help is not about passing the issue on to an expert, but thinking about what is the best support you can offer. You can provide effective support by: ▪ Listening ▪ working with other people who could help ▪ finding out about specialist agencies who could help ▪ filling out an Early Help Assessment with the person you are helping ▪ contacting Children's Social Care if you think the problem is more serious

Fabricated and induced illness (FII)	Fabricated or induced illness (FII) is a rare form of child abuse. It occurs when a parent or carer, exaggerates or deliberately causes symptoms of illness in the child. Please see the website at NHS guidance
Honour based violence (HBV)	'Honour' based violence (HBV) occurs when perpetrators believe a relative or other individual has shamed or damaged a family's or community's 'honour' or reputation (known in some communities as izzat), and that the only way to redeem the damaged 'honour' is to punish and/or kill the individual. 'Honour' based violence is a term that is widely used to describe this sort of abuse however it is often referred to as so called 'honour' based violence because the concept of 'honour' is used by perpetrators to make excuses for their abuse. There is a very strong link between 'honour' based violence, forced marriage and domestic abuse. The term 'honour based violence' is the internationally recognised term describing cultural justifications for violence and abuse. Honour based violence cuts across all cultures and communities: Turkish, Kurdish, Afghani, South Asian, African, Middle Eastern, South and Eastern European for example. Female genital mutilation (FGM)	Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) comprises all procedures involving partial or total removal or the external female genitalia. FGM is illegal in the UK and as of October 2015 mandatory reporting commenced. If education staff or other professionals discovers that an act FGM appears to have been carried out on a girl under 18 years old there is a

Children Missing in Education (CME)	Children Missing Education (CME) refers to any child of compulsory school age who is not registered at any formally approved education activity e.g. school, alternative provision, elective home education, and has been out of education provision for at least 4 weeks. CME also includes those children who are missing (family whereabouts unknown), and are usually children who are registered on a school roll / alternative provision. This might be a child who is not at their last known address and either has not taken up an allocated school place as expected, or has 10 or more days of continuous absence from school without explanation, or left school suddenly and the destination is unknown. Missing Children and Adults Strategy (vulnerable children and adults who go missing)	Every year an estimated 200,000 people go missing in the UK. In some cases, missing adults may have made a choice to leave and 'start their lives over again', but the vast majority of missing people, children and adults, are vulnerable and need protection and support. The police should be informed if any child or adult goes missing. The Missing Children and Adults strategy can then be referred to for further information and help.
